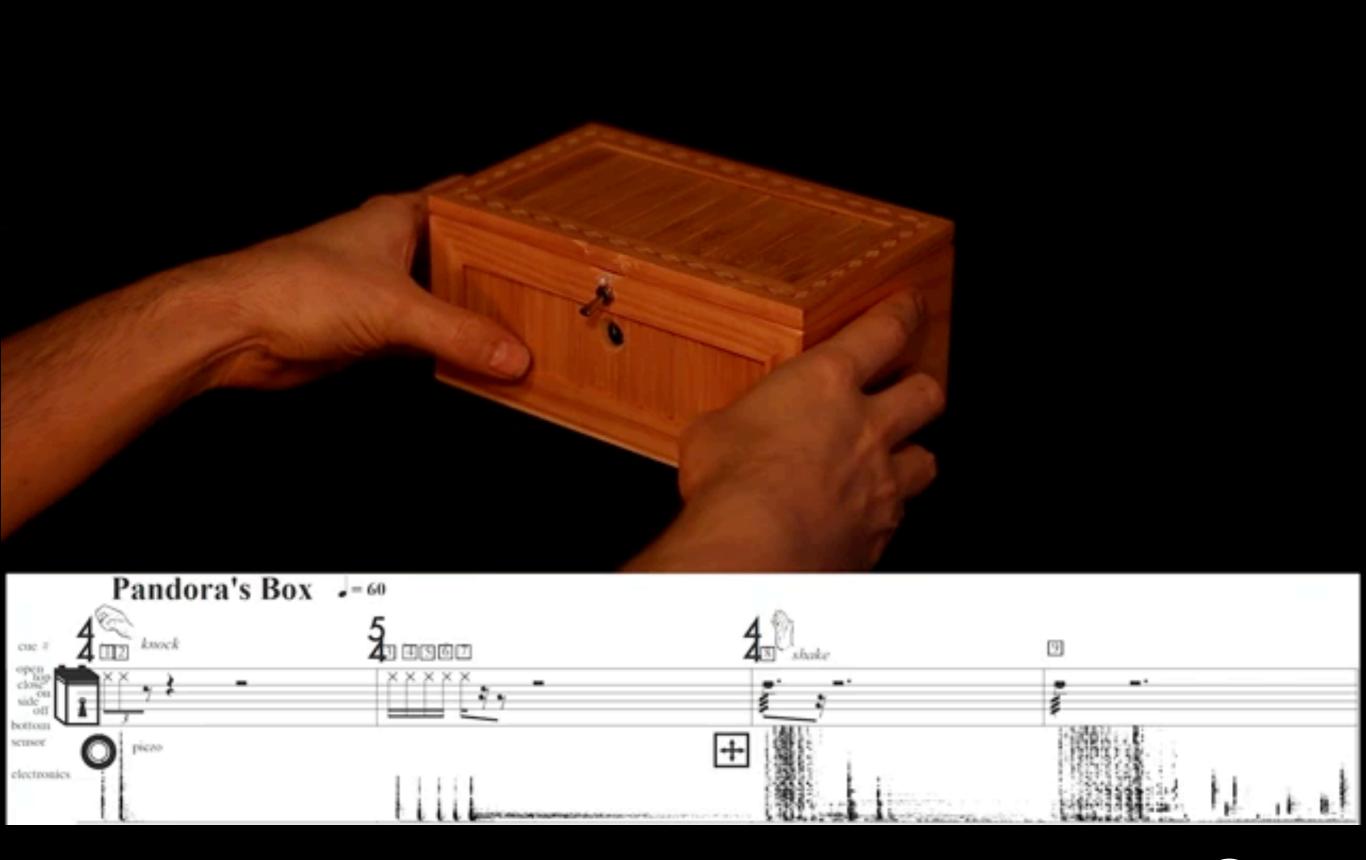

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Aspect	MIDI	osc
Resolution	7-bit (0–127)	32-bit floating-point
Data Flexibility	Fixed message format, limited to MIDI parameters	Customizable, user-defined messages
Network Capability	Limited, mostly local (5-pin or USB)	Network-native (UDP/IP), internet- compatible
Ideal Use Cases	Simple panning, basic control setups	Complex, high-precision spatialization, interactive installations

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what is a **Serial** protocol? (USB, UART, I²C) -> data is transmitted sequentially (bit by bit) over a single communication line or channel

- 1. Traditional MIDI Controllers (keyboards, pads, faders, knobs)
- 2. Alternative Instrument Controllers (Wind Controllers, string controllers, electronic drum kits)
- 3. Touch and Multitouch Controllers (Tablets/Phones, Specialized Surfaces)
- 4. Wearable and Gestural Controllers (gloves, motion sensors, body sensors)
- 5. Custom DIY Controllers (Arduino or ESP32-based controllers, Modular controllers Monome, Eigenharp or digitaize)
- 6. Brain-Computer Interfaces (Emotiv headsets, EEG-based systems)
- 7. Haptic Controllers (vibration motors or actuators for tactile feedback)
- 8. Environmental and Sensor-Based Controllers (microphones, light sensors and cameras, pressure or temperature)
- 9. Al-Driven and Generative Controllers (Al systems that learn from and adapt to performer behavior, Generative controllers based on randomness or procedural systems.)

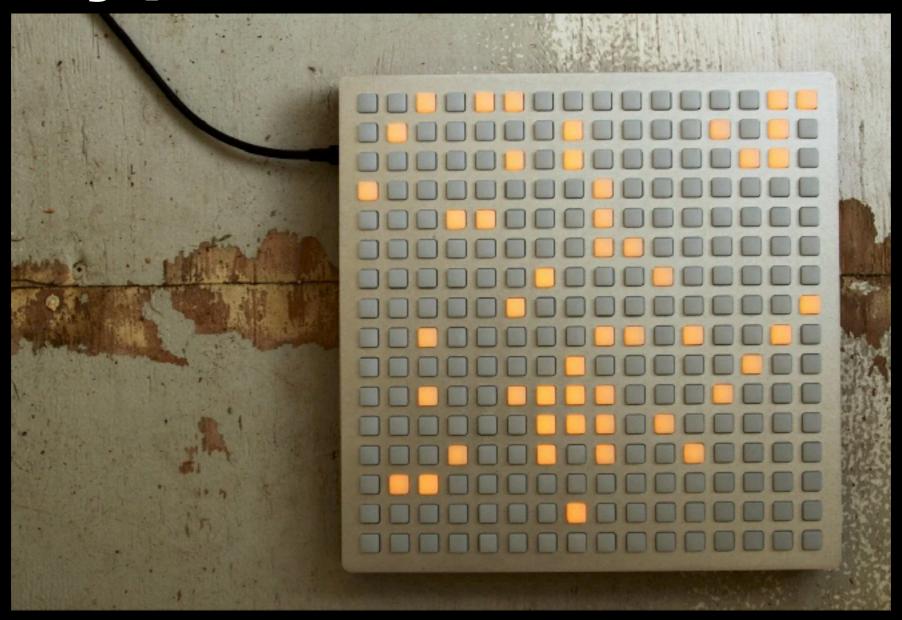

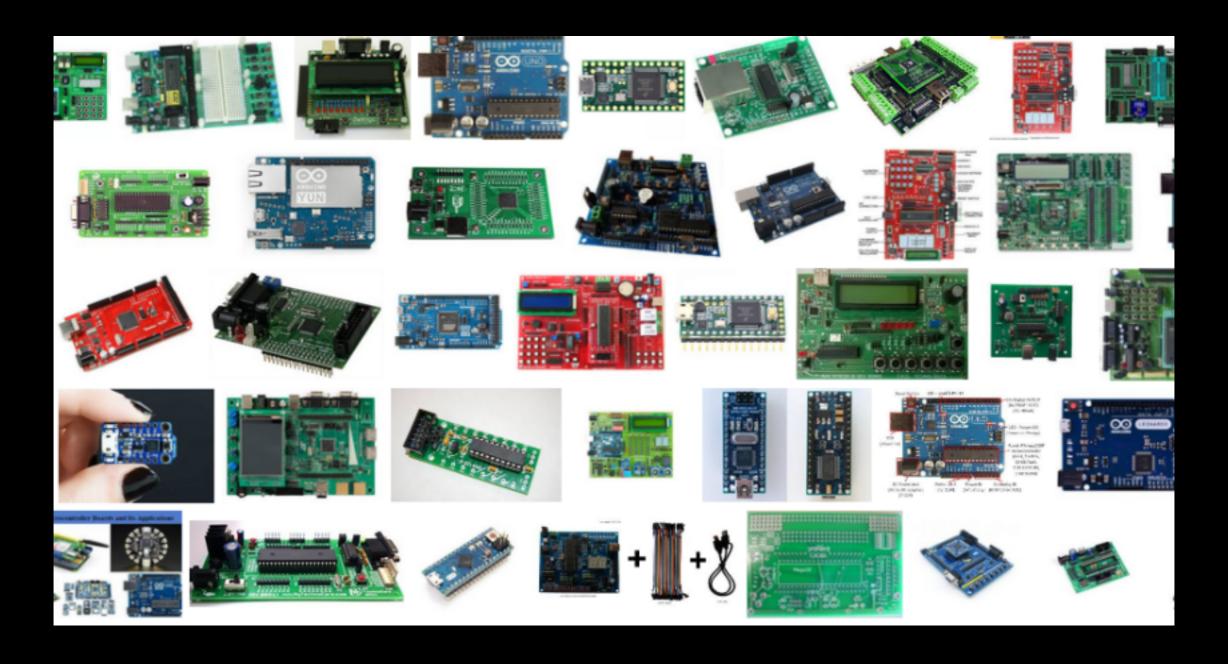

Microcontrollers

- General-Purpose Microcontrollers (arduino, raspberry pi pico, teensy) -> MIDI Controllers, Sensor Input, Audio Reactive Systems,
- 2. High-Performance Microcontrollers (Teensy 4.x Series, ESP32, STM32) -> Audio Synthesis, Complex Sensor Processing, Wireless MIDI/OSC
- 3. Internet of Things (IoT)-Enabled Microcontrollers (ESP8266, ESP32, Particle Photon) -> Collaborative Performance, Distributed Installations, IoT Music Interfaces
- 4. Specialized Audio Microcontrollers (Bela Boards, Axoloti Core, Teensy Audio Boards) -> Standalone Synthesizers, Audio Effects Processors, Low-Latency Interaction
- 5. DIY and Modular Systems (Micro:bit, Makey Makey, Adafruit Boards) -> Educational Projects, Interactive Installations, Rapid Prototypin

Microcontrollers: aspects to consider

Microcontrollers

Feature	Microcontroller	Raspberry Pi
Processing Power	Low (8-bit/16-bit/32-bit, single- core)	High (multi-core ARM processor)
Memory	Small (few KB to MB)	Large (512MB to 8GB RAM)
Power Consumption	Very low	Higher (requires external power source)
os	None or real-time operating system	Full operating system (Linux-based)
Programming	Low-level (C, C++)	High-level (Python, Java, C++)
1/0	Digital and analog I/O pins, PWM	Digital I/O, GPIO, requires extra components for analog I/O
Cost	Low (few dollars)	Moderate (typically \$5–\$70)
Use Cases	Embedded, simple controls, IoT devices	Full computing, networking, multimedia

What Is A Phidget?

At Phidgets, our philosophy is that you don't have to be an electrical engineer in order to create sophisticated projects using motors, sensors and other electronics. You simply need to know how to code.

Phidgets are building-blocks for sensing and control using a computer, tablet, or phone. Phidgets enable your software application to interact with the physical world.





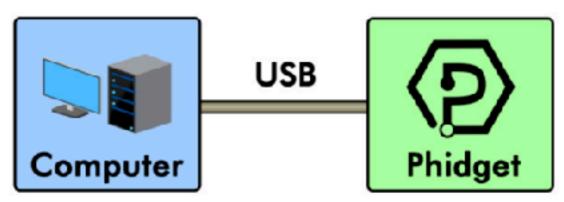

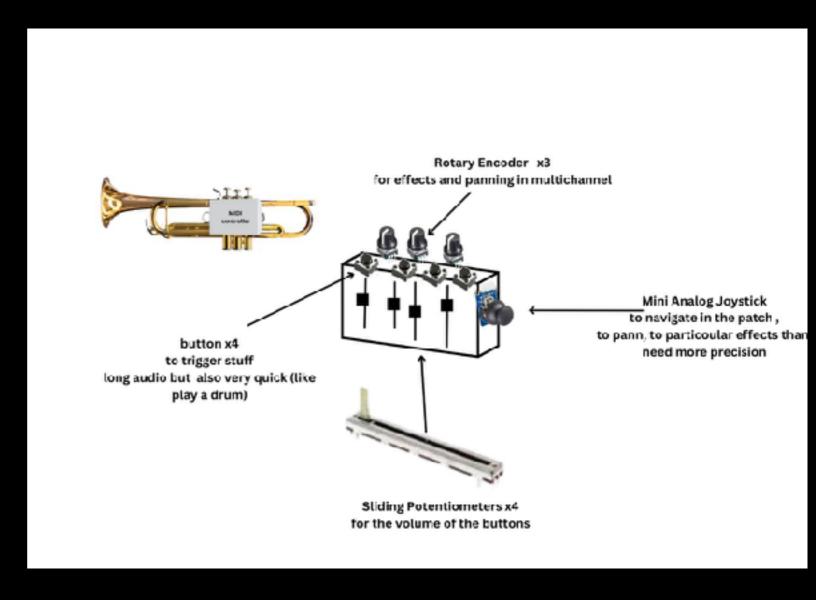
Phidgets connect via a USB port:

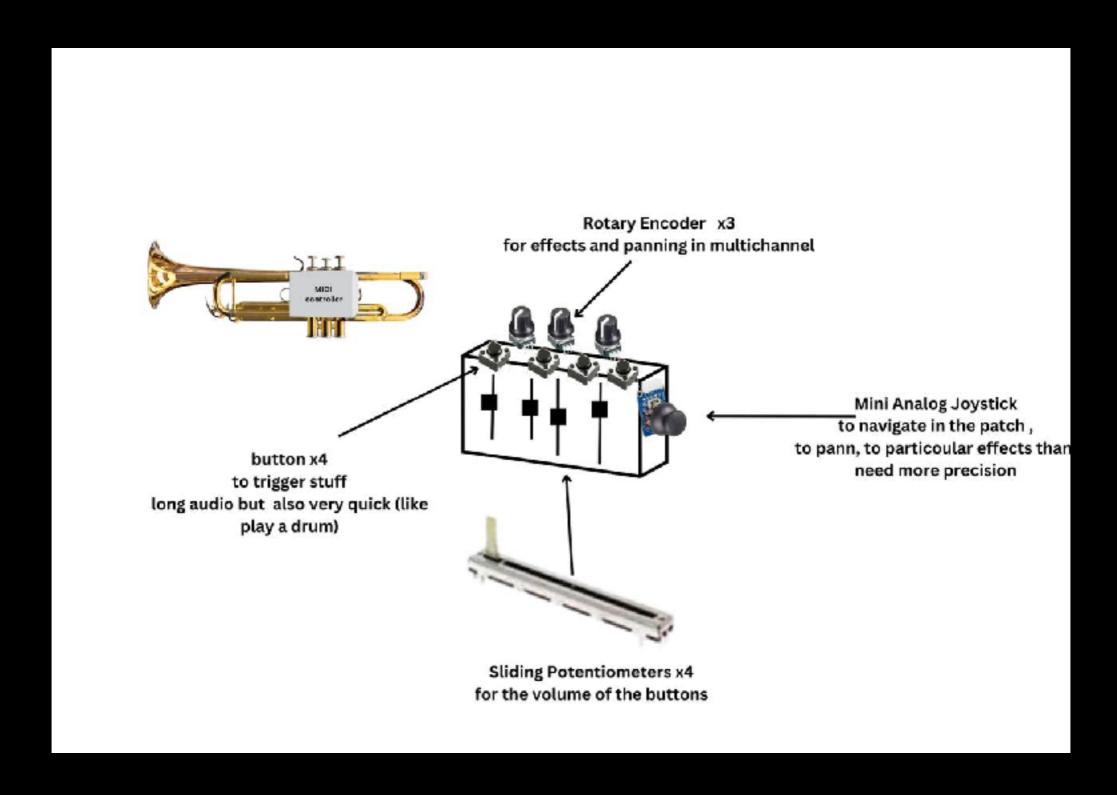

- 10. Keep the Music in Focus

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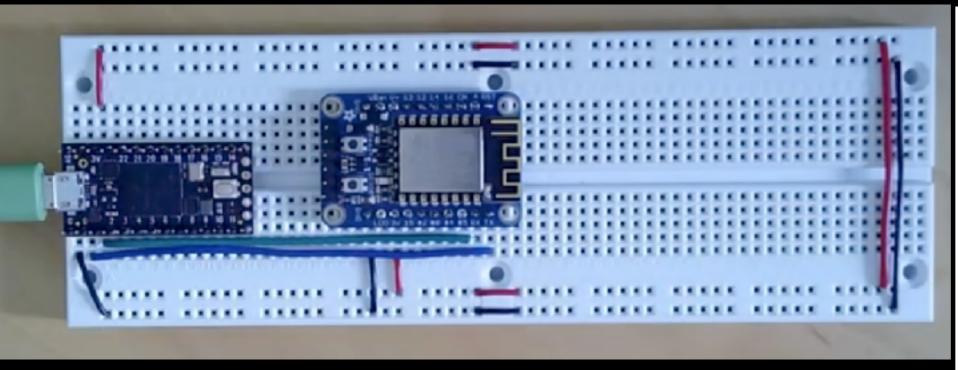
