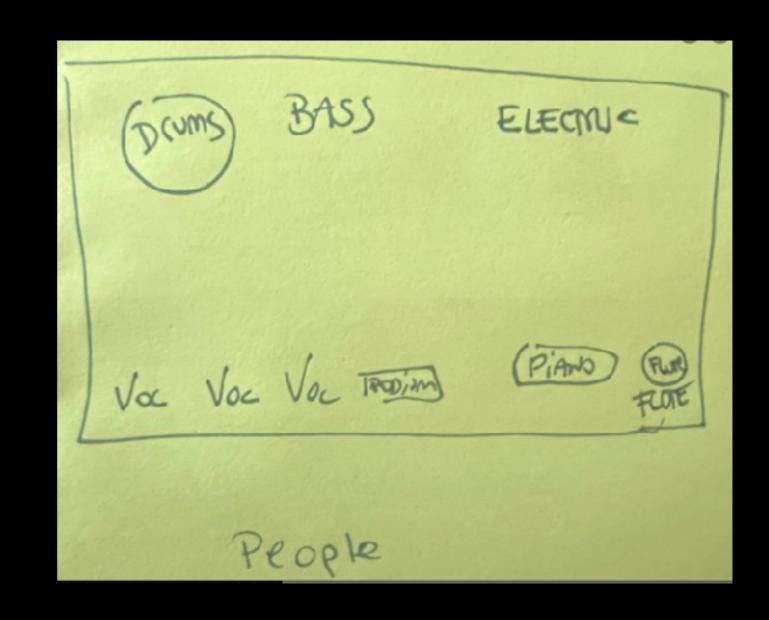


### What is a Technical Rider?

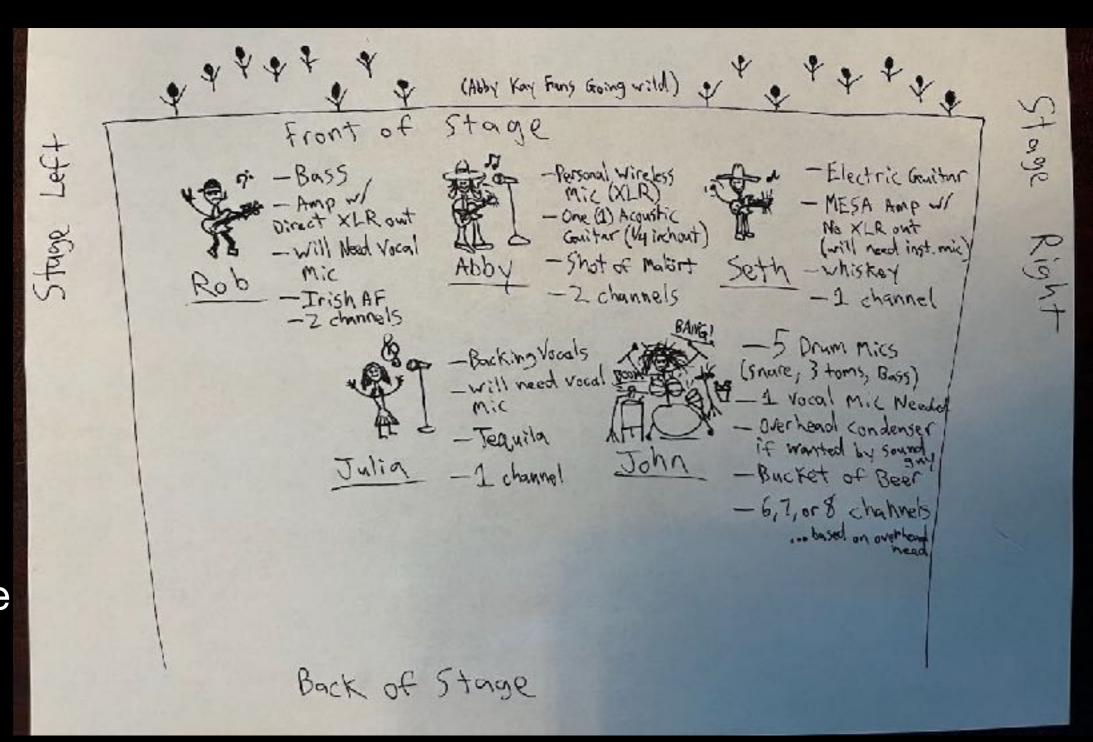
- T.R.- technical information an artist should have on hand to provide to a venue, promoter, stage manager or sound engineer in advance of playing a show.
- A Technical Rider should include a Stage Plan (sometimes called a Stage Plot), Channel List (sometimes called an Input List) and an Equipment/Backline List.

Do you have your own microphones? Tripods? Instruments? A desk/technician?

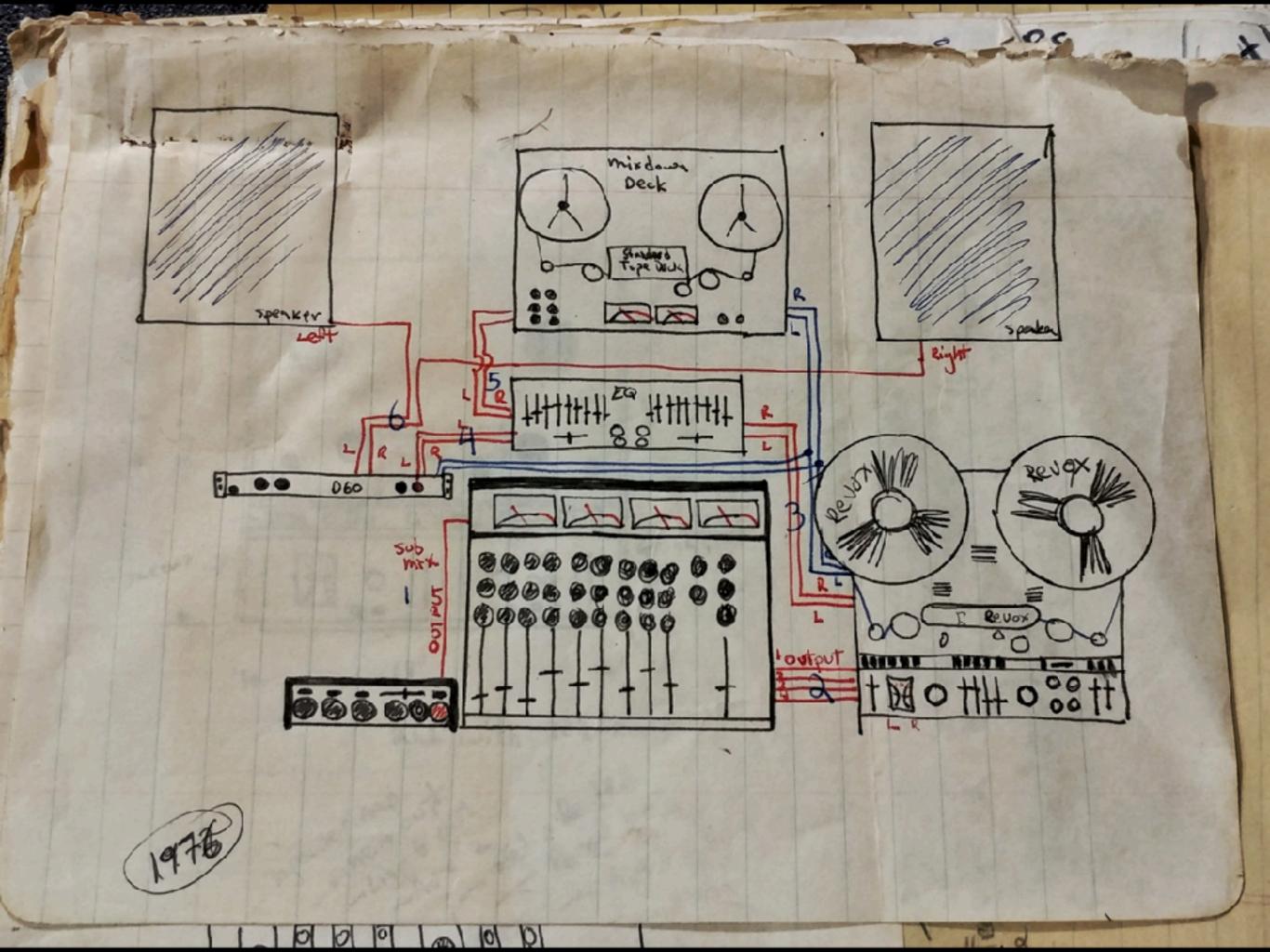
#### 4. a drawing of the stage with positions

#### 6. comments, wishes

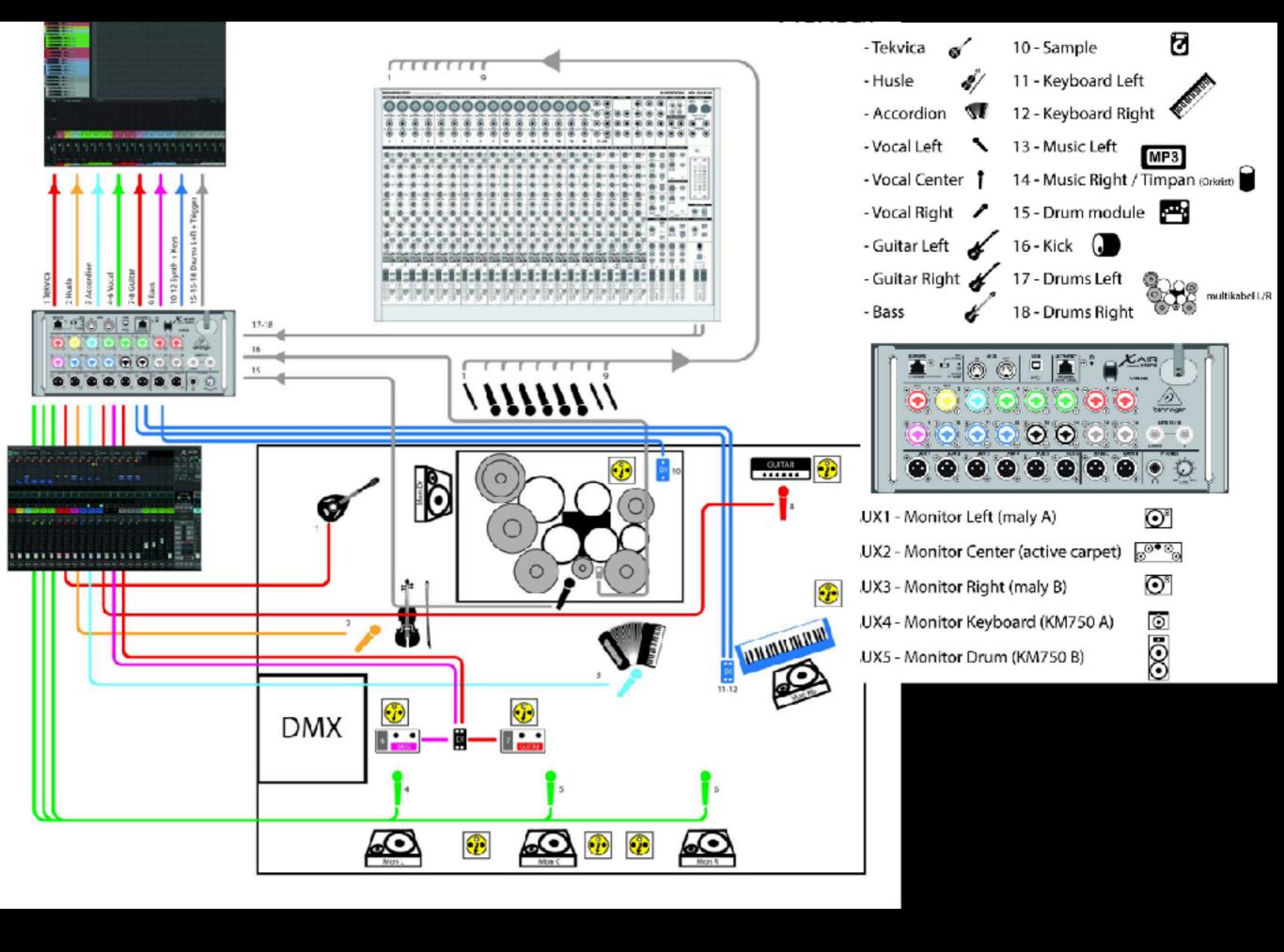

## What is a Stage Plot?

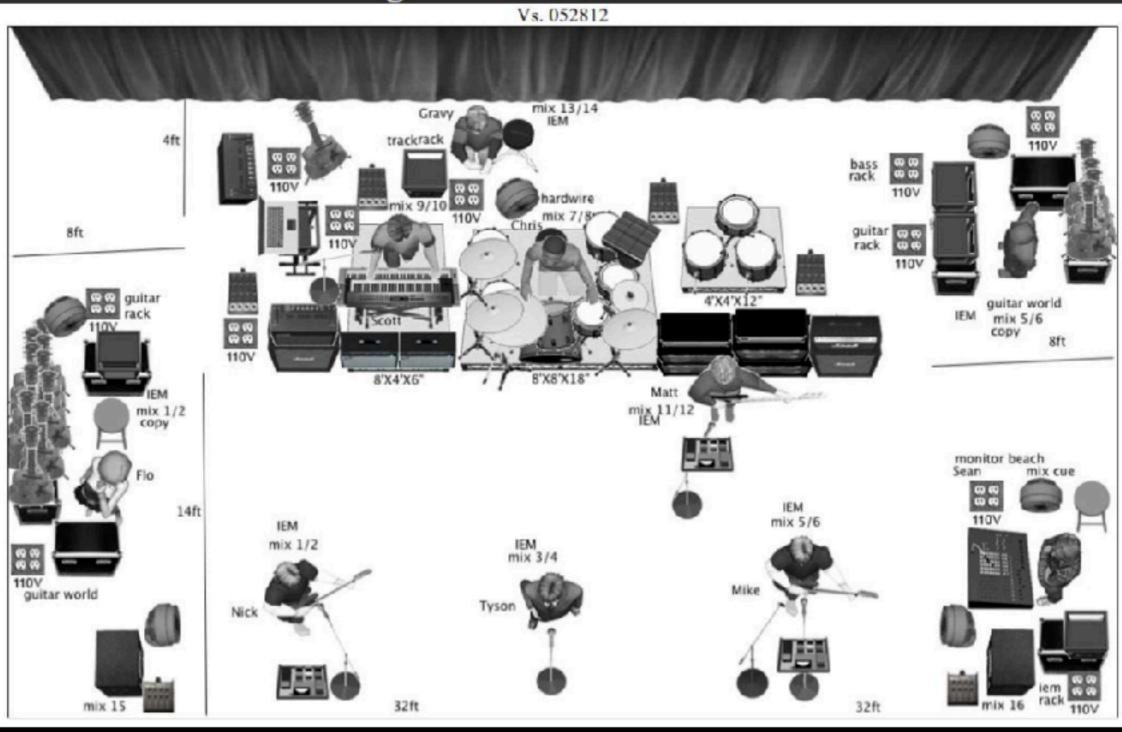
 A stage plot is a visual representation of how a band or performer wants their stage setup to look during a live event.

### Differenc es Between **Technical** Riders and Stage **Plots**

Aspect	Technical Rider	Stage Plot
Defin <b>iti</b> o n	A document detailing all technical requirements for a performance, including equipment, sound, lighting, and stage setup.	A visual diagram showing the layout of the stage, including the positioning of musicians, instruments, and equipment.
Purpose	Ensures that the venue can meet the technical needs of the performance and provides specific instructions for setup.	Provides a clear, visual representation of the stage layout to guide the setup team.
Content	Includes sound equipment, lighting needs, power requirements, dressing room needs, hospitality, and other specifics.	Depicts the positions of instruments, musicians, monitors, microphones, and other equipment on stage.
Format	Usually a detailed list or written document with sections for various requirements.	A visual diagram or sketch, often accompanied by brief labels for each item or position.
Audi <b>en</b> c e	Technical staff, production managers, sound and lighting engineers, and venue managers.	Stage crew, sound engineers, lighting technicians, and performers.
Details Included	Exact equipment models, quantities, connection details, input/output lists, and special instructions for sound or lighting.	Basic positions of equipment and performers, without specifying detailed technical settings.
Usage Frequenc y	May be several pages long, especially for complex productions, and used throughout the setup and sound check.	Typically a single-page document used during stage setup.
Changes /Updates	Often customized for each venue based on its capabilities.	May remain relatively consistent, only needing updates if the band lineup or stage configuration changes.
Impact on Performa nce	Critical for achieving the desired sound and visual effects, impacting overall production quality.	Crucial for ensuring performers and equipment are placed correctly for the performance to proceed smoothly.
Example s of Content	Audio mixer preferences, microphone types, lighting cues, hospitality requests (e.g., catering, dressing rooms).	Placement of drum kits, guitar amps, vocal microphones, monitor speakers, keyboards.

- your routings (hardware, software)
- safety/logistical requirements

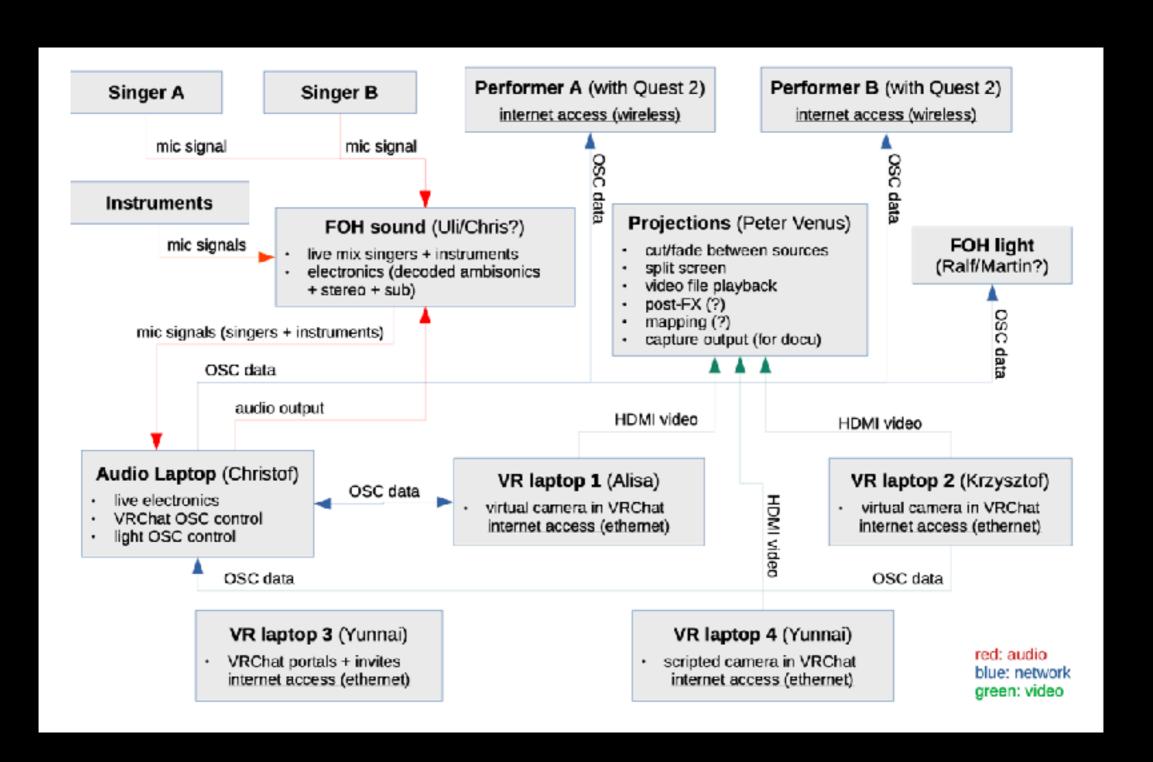
### Common Challenges and Solutions

- venue limitations insufficient power supply, inadequate sound systems, or limited space for projection (have a backup plan)
- equipment incompatibility (think of flexible configurations)
- Changing Requirements during Development (communicate changes in advance)
- Unanticipated Technical Failures (backup computer!)
- Audio-Visual Synchronization Problems (use timecode, external clocks or synchronization devices)
- people with mobile phones (interference for wifi. use cables instead)
